



AKTION CLUB SPECIAL OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES



Special Olympics Georgia hosted the Indoor Winter Games in Cobb County on the weekend of January 27-29. After being canceled the three previous years due to the pandemic, the annual gymnastics competition was back in full swing at the Cobb Gymnastics Center.

Victoria Turney, Georgia On-Line Kiwanian, put in a full morning of cheering on the athletes and assisting where needed. "Giving back to the athletes warms your heart and gets the day started off right," said Victoria who has been working with the Special Olympics Cobb County gymnastics team for more than seven years.

Kiwanians have a long history of volunteering for the Special Olympics gymnastics competition at the Winter Games and are directly responsible for the formation of the Chattooga AKTION Club in 2016. At the Games that year, Victoria asked Cobb County coach, Cindy Bickman, if she had ever heard of

AKTION Club. She hadn't, YET, but introduced Victoria to some of the athletes and parents.

"I didn't know that Victoria's mention of AKTION Club would lead to so many good things for our athletes," said Cindy. "Fortunately, we took what she shared seriously."

Soon afterward, the Chattooga AKTION Club was chartered and, to this day, the relationship continues with joint service projects benefitting the community and, of course, gymnastics competitions.

The Jonquil City Kiwanis Club, sponsor of the Chattooga AKTION Club, continues to support the competition by assisting with the physical set up and close down.

Again this year, an air of exhilaration spread through the stands and the gym floor. But no one was more excited than the athletes. Forty of them, all hoping to win gold, competed on the vault, uneven bars,

balance beam, and floor exercise.

AKTION Club member Darby Parker, for one, loves participating in Special Olympics with all her friends from the gym. "She trains so hard, gets a little nervous," said her mom, Manya, "but always has the best time of her life. This year was extra special. She rose to her best competition level, competing in all events. Her Gold All-Around medal made her feel so accomplished." And she was!



Please enter your club elections as quickly as possible, so that your club's officers may be listed in the District and International Directories. All clubs must use the Kiwanis One system when filing your club election report. Secretaries, when you log in, click on Secretary Dashboard and you will see the current club officers - click on the arrow to show the 2023-24 year and enter your new officers.

Our International Convention in Minneapolis is just around the corner. If your club is unable to provide a delegate, you may select a Past Lieutenant Governor or the Current Lieutenant Governor of your Division to represent your club if they are attending and not representing another club.

If a Past Lieutenant Governor agrees to represent your club it is the responsibility of the club to get the Delegate Certificate of Election form to the District Office for signature. An exciting time of fellowship, entertainment, and information is in store for all who attend the convention, plus we will be celebrating with Katrina Baranko as she is elected President of Kiwanis International for the 2023-24 year.

Incoming Lieutenant Governors will be trained April 28th - 30th by Governor-Elect Brent Leslie. Following their training they will begin making club contact visits. Work with them and do not forget to line-up your Lieutenant Governor to install your 2023-24 club officers.

Remember to do your on line Monthly reports by the 10th of each month, and if your club has any outstanding balance due Kiwanis International or the District please pay them as soon as possible, and remember all dues and new member fees go to Kiwanis International. **All Club Dues and New Member Adds must be paid for your Club Delegate to be seated in the House of Delegates. (Note any amount over \$149.00 must be paid.)**

INTERCLUB TIPS

What is an inter-club? Inter-clubbing involves arranging visits between clubs in the same town, division, and district, as well as inter-district get-togethers. You can also take advantage of all current division/district opportunities to do interclubs (Governor's Rallies, division council meetings, face-to-face and virtual trainings, conventions, charter nights, special celebrations, etc.).

Inter-clubbing is a means of building the Kiwanis community and a way to form friendship ties with other Kiwanis clubs. It should also include the goal of meaningful interaction and information sharing. To be successful at inter-clubbing (1) get an Interclub Chair and/or form an Interclub Committee (Most significant of all), (2) when you want to do an interclub, be sure to contact the Interclub Chair, the Club President, or the Club Secretary of the club you are planning to visit, (3) be sure you tell your Club Secretary so they can report it on the monthly report, (4) use special occasions and events like charter nights for new clubs, club anniversary celebrations for established clubs, and special activities for some clubs are excellent times to do inter-clubs (be sure you have or get invitations to attend), (5) don't forget your SLP's and attend their meetings and service/fundraising events, and (6) pay attention to scheduled events in the division/district and take advantage of all opportunities to do interclubs (Governor's Rallies, division council meetings, face-to-face and virtual trainings, conventions, charter nights, special celebrations, etc.).

I have been a Kiwanian since October 1, 2000 and really was not aware at that time of the many great things other Kiwanis clubs do. I also assumed that all Kiwanis clubs were about the same (please no jokes about a bunch of grandfathers who enjoyed eating together one time a week) and operated the same way. When I became Lt. Governor in 2005 and began to do the required visits to the clubs in my division, do division council meetings, attend the Governor's rally, and attend district trainings and conventions I learned what a great organization Kiwanis is. I learned to appreciate the diversity of the membership, the breath of service, and the multitude of events. The March 2023 report shows that we are at approximately the same place at this point in 2023 as we were in 2022. Perhaps because of the change in the inter-club requirements requiring two members to participate, it is expected that twice as many Kiwanians have been involved in inter-clubs this year. This year the inter-clubbers are focusing more on their home division and their SLP's. Interesting!

Is your club continually inviting prospective members to your meetings or service projects? Are you following the "2For2" membership growth plan that all of Kiwanis International is working on this year? Is your members leaving your club? What can your club do to retain new members?

Glad you asked! We have a 5 point plan program to assist your club in retaining existing members. A common sense program that has been proven time after time to keep members in your club. The Georgia District membership team has proven year after year that we can recruit members for new clubs and has been successful in assisting existing clubs keep current members if they follow the plan. It begins with having a membership chair listed on the Secretary Dashboard and the club have a membership plan and to execute that plan throughout each year. Why? Because the Kiwanis International membership committee will send you valuable information on effective methods in keeping your existing members. Additionally, membership retention is a weekly/monthly commitment that has a HUGE payoff at the end of each Kiwanis year. One of the best

procedures your Board of Director's can do is to continually keep track of members to insure everyone is current in dues, contact those who are behind and give them a deadline to pay or be dropped. Don't wait until August-September to bill, bill monthly or at most quarterly.

Step 1- Evaluate Your Club.

Review every aspect of your club to determine if you are viable or need some changes. Keep your membership active. Get new members Kiwanis orientated and let them know all your club does for your community and beyond. Younger members would rather serve their community than attend a meeting.

Step 2- Club Atmosphere.

Are your meeting friendly, inviting, interesting and fun? Do you have a greeter at the door? Do you invite representatives from your SLP's to your meeting? Happy Bucks, Brag and Complain time? (Costs a dollar). Speakers informative and relevant to community needs?

Step 3- Active members.

Are you recognizing those who go above and beyond? Appreciation to members by awarding gift cards, certificates or Kiwanis awards? Do you ask committee chairs if they want to continue each year or assume they will? Keep the membership of upcoming service

projects or fundraisers to explain their part in making them successful?

Non-Active Members.

Contact members who miss meetings to let them know they were missed and that you care. See if they need any assistance to your meetings. Send cards, email or call them. Let them know the club is having a fundraiser or service project and invite them to assist. Welcome them back when they return.

New Members.

Make sure that their sponsor is there with them for the first year to explain what is going on, interpret the alphabet names (CLE, SLP, ICON, DCON ect.) because they likely do not have a clue. Have a member orientation to let them see the BIG picture of Kiwanis International. Put new members on a committee and keep them active. Ask what non-profits in your community that they care about and let them know how your club can assist them.

Each year, all Districts lose members by the hundreds. Retaining current members as well as recruiting new members should be a priority in every club.

PLEASE plan to attend the Mid-Year Training Conference on April 15 and come to my class on Membership Retention. Byron Mullican, Immediate Past Governor

- **Submission of a club signature project** in the Kiwanis International annual Signature Project Contest.
- **Increase in Club Leadership Education (CLE) participation** over the previous administrative year.
- **Achievement of 90% compliance in mandatory background checks** among all required leaders.

PINNACLE DISTRICTS

GROWTH (Must accomplish all)

- **Meet the above requirements** to become a Distinguished District.
- **Achieve a net gain in active Kiwanis clubs** over the previous Kiwanis administrative year (as certified by October 10, 2023).
- **Charter a total of five (5) new K-Kids clubs** over the previous Kiwanis administrative year.

PINNACLE CLUBS

GROWTH (Must accomplish two of three)

- **Minimum of 10% net increase in membership** over the prior year's membership, as certified by October 10, 2023.
- **Sponsorship of a new Kiwanis club** during the year.
- **Participation in the Two For Two program all 12 months of the year**, as reported in the club's official monthly reports.

SERVICE (Must accomplish two of three)

- **Minimum required increase in overall giving to the Kiwanis Children's Fund** (as determined by the Children's Fund).
- **Participation in the Kiwanis Signature Project Contest** during the administrative year.
- **Increase in the number of specific or overall Service Leadership Programs clubs** in good standing during the previous administrative year.

But, even when I do fall, my Special Olympics family is always there to cheer me on because they know that gravity is working as it should be, and I've done the best I can!"

Ron Davis, the Kiwanis advisor for AKTION Club, claimed he was as proud as any parent at the Games.

"These young women warm my heart and inspire me at every level. They are winners at the Games and in life."

Victoria concluded the day by emceeing the awards ceremony with her usual enthusiasm. The Jonquil City Kiwanis Club helped present the awards. Debbie McCracken, the Division 15 Lt. Governor, and a huge Special Olympics supporter, also assisted with awarding medals to the winners.

So, how do you support your SLPs? What should you be doing? I have shamelessly stolen this from Past International President Paul Palazzolo. These are the things that a Kiwanis should be doing with each of their sponsored Service Leadership Programs. My comments are italicized.

1. Appoint a Kiwanian or a committee of Kiwanians to be SLP advisors (be sure they have approved Kiwanis Background Checks). *This should be obvious, but not every club has done this. Although only one will be reflected on the Secretary Dashboard, you can have more than one.*

2. Attend SLP club meetings and events. *You may not be able to attend all of their meetings and events, but they should be able to recognize you when you do show up.*

3. Maintain an expense line item in your service account to support your SLP. *Your SLPs need your financial support. Are you helping them with fees to attend training and conventions?*

4. Meet with the school principal or facility manager at least once each year. *Do it at the beginning of the school year. Get to know who these people are so you can maintain leadership and support for your clubs.*

5. Ensure all dues and fees are paid. *Kiwanis Clubs pay the fees for their K-Kids and Builder's Clubs, but you also need to monitor the fees for your Key Clubs, Circle K Clubs, and Aktion Clubs.*

6. Make sure SLP club officers receive proper training. *GA Key Club conducts training at their Georgia Leadership Training Conference (GLTC) each year, GA Circle K conducts training at their Club Officer Leadership Training (COLT) each year, Other training resources:*

7. Schedule an annual meeting with Kiwanis and SLP Club Leadership. *A great opportunity to*

plan out your years to include each other.

8. Host or participate in joint activities. *Work together to support each other's fundraisers and service projects. Go do something fun together (miniature golf, bowling, a picnic).*

9. Invite SLP club members to attend Kiwanis meetings. *Having SLP members come to your meetings helps them to understand you as a club and as individuals.*

10. Ensure SLP members get training opportunities beyond the club level. *Wouldn't it be great to see some of your SLP members become District or International officers?*

KIWANIS WEBSITE HOSTING CHANGES EFFECTIVE FEBRUARY 2023

GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE UPDATES

Portalbuzz previously had integration with Kiwanis Connect, Kiwanis' club management system, but as of February 2023, the data connection will be severed, meaning Portalbuzz club management features will no longer exist.

Your website will NOT disappear and you will continue to have access to all website functionality that it current has but your Club will need to decide how they would like to continue hosting their website. Clubs have the choice to stay with Portalbuzz or switch to Kiwanis Connect WordPress or switch to a different platform.

FAQs

WHAT IS PORTALBUZZ?

Portalbuzz is a third-party system that Kiwanis Clubs are free to use to manage their websites. This is an additional paid service, not one required for club management purposes.

WHAT IS KIWANIS CONNECT?

All club officers should be using <https://members.kiwanis.org/> to access the club management features (adding/deleting members, updating rosters, secretary reports, updating bylaws, background checks, updating Service Leadership Program advisor information, etc.)

WHAT WILL PORTALBUZZ LOOK LIKE AFTER CONNECTION WITH KIWANIS CONNECT IS SEVERED?

You will continue to have access to all website functionality that it current has. After February 2023, you will need to manually enter your members' information in Kiwanis Connect if you wish to use the features that utilize this information.

WHAT NOW?

Your club can either choose to stay with Portalbuzz and continue paying their fee as long as it is available to clubs and this will be separate from Kiwanis International's system.

OR

Clubs can pay a smaller fee for website management and switch to Kiwanis' new WordPress website

hosting where Kiwanis creates a free website for you, your members customize it, and you pay for only the domain.

OR

Clubs can switch to a different website hosting system separate from Kiwanis International such as Weebly (the Georgia District uses this platform for the District's website), GoDaddy, Wix, Bluehost, HostGator, etc. Fees vary and it would be up to the Club's choice.

HOW DO I TRANSFER CONTENT?

If you have a well-established website with a lot of pages and hesitate to switch, you can ask Portalbuzz to provide your club's site assets, which you can then import onto another system.

You will need to manually transfer content yourself or you can hire a web designer to do this for you.



The Buck-n-Ear Project was founded in 1984 benefiting the Auditory-Verbal Center and is considered a Priority One Signature Project for the Georgia District of Kiwanis.

For 45 years, the Auditory-Verbal Center, a non-profit organization, has provided a family-centered and holistic approach to supporting and improving the lives of the deaf or hard of hearing.

All of their Auditory-Verbal Therapists are Speech-Language Pathologists who specialize exclusively in teaching children with hearing loss to listen and speak. They are trained to develop the listening pathways in a child's brain, laying the foundation for a lifetime of listening and speaking WITHOUT the need for sign language or lip reading. They also provide

intervention directly in Spanish with a bilingual therapist!

All donations from the Buck-n-Ear program go towards the scholarship program to help pay for Auditory-Verbal Therapy sessions for families who are uninsured or underinsured.

The Auditory-Verbal Center has their main office in Atlanta with a satellite office in Macon. They also have teletherapy which allows clients to receive therapy virtually.


Our Why

With the Administrative Year in Kiwanis almost half over, I am hoping that clubs in the Georgia District have already made their Annual Gifts to the Kiwanis Children's Fund (KCF). If you have not, I am asking that you consider making this a priority as we move into the last half of the year.

Understand that the Kiwanis Children's Fund is your organization and that your gifts impact Kiwanians around the World. Yes, your gifts are also taking care of children in need all over the Globe. These are children you may never meet, but the name of Kiwanis will be etched in the hearts and minds of children worldwide because of your generosity. **Let's show the Kiwanis World that the Georgia District can lead the way.**

As one of Governor Darryl's goals for the year, he has asked that each club make a contribution to the Kiwanis Children's Fund that equates to, as a minimum, \$5.00 per member. As of February 2023, 49 Georgia clubs have contributed \$12,469 to KCF. Also, the Kiwanis Children's Fund President has challenged each District to increase its club giving by 10% from the previous year. This means that the Georgia District's Challenge is for the clubs to contribute \$34,303 in order to meet the challenge. To date, a total of \$610,557 has been contributed to KCF. Of this amount, \$290,376 came from clubs, and \$297,662 came from individual giving. We have met the President's Challenges in the past. **LET'S KEEP OUR RECORD INTACT!**

From time to time, I get questions about the Kiwanis Children's Fund Club Grant Program. It is important to note that, since 1940, KCF has helped Kiwanians extend their impact - in their hometowns and around the world. One of the ways we make it happen is by the Club Grant Program. The Club Grant program does more than fill a funding gap. It is also a

collaboration. The guide to the club grants can be found by going online to the Kiwanis Children's Fund website. To be eligible, a project must support activities addressing at least one of the following Children's Fund cause areas:

health and nutrition, education and literacy youth leadership development. Know that all clubs are eligible to request a grant. To date, 11 grants have been awarded to club. These grants totaled \$95,167. The grants ranged from \$1,400 to \$50,000. **If you need to fill a funding gap, get a partner, and request a grant.**

Finally, I want to commend Governor Darryl for the words in his pin, "Filling Unmet Needs 4 Kids." Indeed, these words speak to the mission of **the Kiwanis Children's Fund**, which talks about developing resources that transform the goodwill and vision of Kiwanis into programs that serve the children of the world. Since this organization belongs to all Kiwanians, lets us be true Ambassadors and tell our story, give to support our mission, and ask others to give.
