NOMINEES FOR DISTRICT VICE-GOVERNOR

If you or if you know someone who is interested or wants to eventually be Governor of the Georgia District, the process is as outlined below.

Each district officer shall be an active member in a club of the district. The Governor, Governor-elect, and Vice-Governor shall each have completed a full term as a Lieutenant Governor in the District and a full term as a District Committee Chair of the District. The Governor, Governor-elect, Vice-Governor, and District Executive Director shall have and maintain a clear criminal history background check conducted and verified by Kiwanis International.

Each district officer has the duty and responsibility to:

- a. Promote the Objects of Kiwanis International.
- b. Promote the interests of the clubs within the district.
- c. Perform such duties and responsibilities as are currently prescribed or as may be amended in the bylaws, policies, or procedures of Kiwanis International or of the district or as may be assigned by the District Board.
- d. Actively promote implementation of growth efforts of the district in conjunction with Kiwanis International's strategic growth plan.
- e. Actively promote and support programs of emphasis by Kiwanis International, such as the service leadership programs (where applicable) and the global campaign for children.
- f. Attend all meetings required by the district.
- g. Whenever possible, all district officers are encouraged to attend the Kiwanis International Convention.

THE DISTRICT BYLAWS FOR THE GEORGIA DISTRICT OF KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL, ARTICLE VII, SECTION 3 STATES:

- b. All qualified candidates for Vice-Governor, Governor-elect and Governor must submit written notice of candidacy to the District Executive Director no later than the beginning of the first convention session.
- c. Qualified candidates for Governor, Governor-elect, and Vice-Governor shall:
 - Submit a signed agreement to Kiwanis International to fulfill the duties of office.
 - Submit a signed District Statement of Commitment to the district.
- Have a clear criminal history background check conducted and verified by Kiwanis International and submit a signed document to the district certifying it.
- Submit a letter of nomination from the candidate's club.

Don't delay. Please get your letter of recommendation in soon. It will be a process that will require, in all probability your club having voted to endorse one or more candidates from your club, filing that with the Executive Director's office in Macon, having it screened and approved by the District Screening and Nomination Committee, and then finally the delegates will elect the 2024-25 Vice-Governor at the Georgia District Convention, August 23-25, 2024 in Norcross, Georgia. The elected Vice-Governor will afterwards automatically step up each year to Governor-Elect and Governor.

STEPS TO ENGAGE AND RETAIN MEMBERS OF YOUR CLUB

Take these steps to ensure every member is engaged, enthused and eager to participate in your club.

EVALUATE YOUR CLUB

- Evaluate your meeting site, programs and participation of members.
- 2. Keep your membership current on dues and fees. Don't wait until September to bill for the following year. Collect dues monthly/quarterly and let those behind know that they need to catch up.
- 3. Does your club have service projects and fundraisers often enough to keep your members engaged? Younger members join to serve their communities.
- Do your club officers and board members complete Club Leadership Training yearly and attend district and KI training?

CLUB ATMOSPHERE

- 1. Are your meetings fun, engaging and friendly? Do you have a greeter at the door to make everyone welcome?
- 2. Are your programs interesting, educational and relevant?

INTERCLUB UPDATES

Interclub Chairman Kiwanis Club of Swainsboro

Interclubs are visits to other Kiwanis Club meetings or events, visits to SLP meetings or events, and attendance at Kiwanis training conferences and Kiwanis conventions. Interclub visits are fun and informative and can lead to enduring friendships. They also give you an opportunity to see what other clubs are doing, allowing you to adopt those activities that can benefit your club. It also assists clubs in learning how to conduct business the "Kiwanis Way." I noticed in the most recent Interclub Summary Report that 43 clubs have already begun their in-

- Do you have "Happy Bucks," "Sheriff's Report" or "Brag or Complain" time?
- 4. Are your meetings always positive and encouraging?
- 5. Do you invite Študent Leadership Program (SLP) leaders and members to attend meetings and provide updates?

ACTIVE MEMBERS

- 1. Are you recognizing and showing appreciation to members? Do you give gift cards, certificates or recognition?
- 2. Do you assume that just because they chaired an event in previous years that they will do it again or do you ask them each time that event occurs? Always ask, don't assume?
- 3. Do you inform the members of upcoming events so they can make plans to volunteer?

NON-ACTIVE MEMBERS

- Contact members who miss meetings to let them know they have been missed and offer to help them attend the next meeting.
- 2. Send a card, email or call them if you know they are ill.
- 3. Let them know you are having an event and invite them to attend and participate.
- 4. Welcome them back when they return.

NEW MEMBERS

- 1. Have the sponsor mentor them until they feel comfortable with how your club operates. The sponsor should let the new member know expectations for projects and fundraisers.
- 2. Have a new member orientation that explains what Kiwanis International is and how your club fits into the big picture. Let them know your club's activities and how they can participate.
- Quickly assign new members to a committee to get them involved in activities so they can become comfortable with the club and members. Ask what committee they would do well in serving.
- 4. Ask the new member about their passions for community service and if they know any community needs that the club could address.

Districts lose members every year. Retaining current members and recruiting new members should be a priority for every member of your club. All of us know the "movers and shakers" in our lives who would be a great fit for your club. We need to commit to retain current members and to utilize Two For Two in recruiting efforts.

terclub activity with 157 visits. We are 28% behind last year at this time in interclub visits. That means we need to do some catching up. Our *aspirational* goal is 100 clubs to do Interclubs. Last year we had 80 clubs to do interclubs. You know those clubs who do a very good job of interclubbing are presented with a special patch, the Interclub Challenge Patch, for their club banner. Last year 33 clubs received the Interclub Challenge patch. The criteria for completing the 2023-2024 Interclub Challenge for a banner patch is as follows:

1. *Two members* from a Club count as an "official" interclub visit.

2. Clubs **will** receive a banner patch IF they complete the Interclub Chal-

lenge. A Club must make a minimum of eight interclub visits. **SLPs, Training Conferences, and Conventions do not count for the Interclub Challenge, but do count as interclubs.**

3. Patches will also be given to the top 10 Clubs who have the most visits and to the top 10 Clubs who have the highest miles travelled at the end of the Kiwanis year (Sep 30, 2024).

4. Remember to report all interclubs on your monthly reports and to me to assure you have credit for completing the challenge. You must notify me in addition to entering the visits on the Secretary Dashboard. When you finish the challenge, email me (goodman@ega.edu) and let me know. It will simplify my job.



12-STEPS TO STRENGTHEN YOUR CLUB

Want to increase your membership? Here are 12 steps to excite members, impress your prospects and enhance everyone's Kiwanis experience.

- 1. MAKE YOUR PURPOSE KNOWN. Create a vision with your club and mention it in every meeting, newsletter, news release, fundraising ticket and advertisement.
- 2. REMIND THEM OFTEN. At every meeting ask; "Who have you invited to come to Kiwanis this week?" Remind every member to look for prospective members and invite someone to come to your meetings. Yes, at every meeting, talk about growing your club!
- 3. GIVE THEM A REASON. Host a contest; Why? It gives everyone an excuse to ask others to come and to join Kiwanis. If you get your club excited and they just ask people to join, you will grow.
- 4. PROMOTE FRIENDLINESS.

Compile an accurate membership list of names, addresses, phone numbers, cell phone numbers, email addresses and distribute copies to every member. Follow that up by emailing them a copy. Keep the list updated and redistribute copies at least every three months. This is a must -- the club members must be able to communicate with each other before the club will grow.

5. SPEAK THEIR LANGUAGE.

Communicate often and in many formats. At least monthly, publish a club newsletter and mail or email a copy to each member. Have additional copies at meetings for guests and prospective members. Send weekly emails to remind members of programs, special projects, fundraisers and include past club visitors.

- 6. PLAN YOUR PROGRAM. Have a set agenda every meeting. This is a huge component of the member experience. Your members will more readily invite prospective members when they know there is a good program planned. Programs should be planned at least two months in advance. Don't just meet and talk over fundraisers.
- 7. **STAY YOUNG.** Invite kids to be a part of your program. Remember, we are an organization dedicated to helping youth so keep young people as the focus of your program agenda.
- 8. DON'T FORGET THE FUN. Every two months or so host a "fun" program to which members invite their friends and family.
- 9. SHOW THEM YOU CARE. Send a "we miss you" card or note to members who have missed meetings, even if you know that they were away on vacation. Especially send one if you know someone is sick. If a member goes to the hospital, take a

collection and send flowers. No matter why they've been absent, send a note telling them they are important and are missed.

10. EXTEND A WARM WELCOME.

Greet new visitors at the first of the meeting and introduce them to the club. In the three weeks following the prospective members' visit, send them a follow-up letter or postcard, even if they don't come back immediately.

11. MAKE IT PERSONAL. Send a letter of invitation to every prospective member who has been invited to join. Each month compose a prospect list of names and addresses and share this list with current members, asking them to contact those on the list. A personal invitation to come and join can be very effective.

12. SHOW APPRECIATION. Send thank-you notes for every donation, no matter how small. Include a picture of your fundraiser or project that they were a part of, particularly any news coverage; it is easy and impressive to the community and prospective members. BRAG ON YOUR TEAM EVERY CHANCE YOU GET

NOTE: Check your club meeting room. You club will only grow to 70% of the capacity of your room, PERIOD. Do you need to move to a bigger room or maybe even a different place? Also, is your room bright and cheery? If not, offer to paint it and clean it up.



2 MEMBERS INVITE 2 PROSPECTS. Every Month.

For the best Kiwanis clubs, membership growth is not a one-time campaign or event. It's a continuous club operation. And every member should play a part. But how do you make it *fun* for them — and manageable for the club?

Two For Two helps you do both.



More hands and more money for service. More administrative dollars. More awareness in your community.

Remind members why recruiting matters.

For members, the message is simple: The larger the club, the more it can do. More members mean more connections, skill sets and ideas. Tasks become easier — and possibilities expand. After all, new members are made by current members. They join because of face-to-face interaction: A Kiwanian shared their story, explained the club's service and fellowship and offered an invitation.

Two For Two provides a way to organize your efforts:

Identify two members to reach out to two

prospects for each of the next several months. This way, members will work in pairs. After all, teams are more successful. They support each other and reach more people more rapidly. And you never know who a prospective member will relate to better. It's a great way to work — from strategizing to honing how they explain the club, its impact and the benefits of fellowship

The members reach out to the prospects.

Use a couple of simple steps: Connect by thanking the prospects for the impact they've made (through service, donations or other activities). Then ask for a date and time to discuss the club, explain the dues structure and answer questions.

The members invite the prospects to a meeting

or service project. After the invitation, they should follow up! A reminder call before the meeting or event. A handwritten thank you, with details specific to the prospect. Inclusion in the club's newsletter distribution. A message with responses to questions the members couldn't answer face to face.

Focus on impact.

Potential members need to know what you do, how you do it, why the community needs them and where they can immediately fit in the process.

AUDITORY-VERBAL CENTER: "BUCK-N-EAR"

Georgia District project since 1984. The Auditory-Verbal Center (AVC), a nonprofit organization 501(c) (3), provides a family-centered and holistic approach to supporting and improving the lives of the deaf and hard of hearing. AVC provides Auditory-Verbal Therapy which teaches children with all degrees of hearing loss how to listen and speak WITHOUT the use of sign language or lip reading. AVC has locations in Atlanta and Macon, and for those families who can't make the drive, they offer Teletherapy. All funds raised through this "Buck-n-Ear" program helps pay for Auditory-Verbal Therapy sessions for families who are underinsured or can't afford the services. GEORGIA DISTRICT ART & MUSIC SHOWCASE

For over 30 years, the Georgia District of Kiwanis Art & Music Showcase has provided students with the opportunity to demonstrate their talents in a competitive atmosphere with students from across the state. The students have received certificates, trophies, awards, and scholarships in recognition of their talent and efforts. In order to qualify for the District Competition, the student must be a winner of a local showcase and sponsored by a Kiwanis Club within Georgia during the same Kiwanis year, and also meet the qualifications for the local and District competitions. In 2017, the Georgia District Kiwanis Foundation provided a total of \$15,000 in Educational Scholarships (\$7,500 for the Art Contest and \$7,500 for the Music Contest). The first-place winner in each contest received an educational scholarship of \$3,500 each.

Buck-n-Ear Project Chair Kiwanis Club of Doraville-Tucker and Brookhaven/Chamblee

The Buck-n-Ear Project was founded in 1984 benefiting the Auditory-Verbal Center and is considered a Priority One Signature Project for the Georgia District of Kiwanis.

For 45 years, the Auditory-Verbal Center, a non-profit organization, has has provided a family-centered and holistic approach to supporting and improving the lives of the deaf or hard of hearing.

All of their Auditory-Verbal Therapists are Speech-Language Pathologists who specialize exclusively in teaching children with hearing loss to listen and speak. They are trained to develop the listening pathways in a child's brain, laying the foundation for a lifetime of listening and speaking WITHOUT the need for sign language or lip reading. They also provide intervention directly in Spanish with a bilingual therapist!

All donations from the Buck-n-Ear program go towards the scholarship program to help pay for Auditory-Verbal Therapy sessions for families who are uninsured or underinsured.

The Auditory-Verbal Center has their main office in Atlanta with a sattelite office in Macon. They also have teletherapy which allows clients to receive therapy virtually.

Did you know that Kiwanis International offers a well-developed toolkit on how to seek corporate sponsorships which could possibly provide financial support for programs your club is trying to implement (https:// www.kiwanis.org/wp-content/uploads/2023/09/sponsorship-toolkit. pdf)

Corporate sponsorships don't always translate to the company writing an annual check to your club. The business sponsorship/ partnership may provide in-kind services such as legal services, accounting services, printing services, tech-support services, website services, and it may also provide volunteers from the company who have a specific skill set (such as geo-surveying services for major flag projects or marketing ideas). In return, the company logos are advertised on your Kiwanis Club website, event banners, or programs.

Not all alliances or partnerships will result in monetary gain for your club. Many alliances or partnerships will provide service opportunities for your club members. Every Christmas season the Salvation Army relies upon the many volunteers from Kiwanis Clubs, and other civic organizations. Kiwanis clubs provide the working hands to ring bells, sort food in food banks, deliver meals on wheels, place wreaths on graves in national cemeteries, greet soldiers returning home at airports, stuff pack-backs for families coming out of homelessness, read to children in schools, and the list is endless.

Kiwanis International has numerous established partners which align with the mission of improving children's lives. HONOR A MEMBER WITH THE HENRY C. HEINZ AWARD

Henry C Heinz was one of the first Kiwanians in Georgia and was involved in Kiwanis International in the formative years of our organization. He served three years as Treasure and Vice President before becoming President of Kiwanis International in 1927-28 (first International Officer from the GA District). Heinz was also part of the formation of the Kiwanis International Foundation, serving as the Foundation's first president in 1941, a position he held until his murder in 1943.
